Washington, D.C. -- January 21, 2015 -- The ACE (Architecture, Construction, Engineering) Mentor Program of America is pleased to announce the appointment of Jack Kalavritinos to President and Chief Executive Officer effective February 1, 2015. In the new role of President and CEO Jack brings over 20 years of leadership experience garnered in both the public and private sectors to ACE, one of America's top workforce development organizations encouraging youth to pursue STEM-related careers. Jack's leadership positions also include Director of Government Affairs and General Counsel for the American Council of Engineering Companies (ACEC) where he worked with volunteer leaders to increase the industry's voice in states and on Capitol Hill; many ACEC members are active ACE sponsors. Jack has also served in other positions within government, political and legal organizations.

Jack earned his undergraduate degree from Wake Forest University in Winston-Salem, N.C., and his law degree from the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C.
